Los Angeles, April 5 .- E. G. Lewis convicted real estate promoter, was sentenced in the federal court today to serve five years and pay a fine of \$14,000 and costs for using the mails to defraud. Lewis and a business associate, Major Henry L. Kramer, are alleged to have taken in more than \$1,000,000 in a personal loan

The five year sentence on Lewis was based on ten of fourteen counts on which he was convicted. On the remaining four counts he was given a sentence of two years each, suspended for five years on condition he does not use the mails in furtherance of any promotional scheme dur-ing the five years.
