State Vote in Primary Election is Tabulated

Weaver High in G. O. P. Vote and Charles W. Pool Shows Way in the Democratic

The final count of the 228,836 votes cast by the republicans and the 228,836 votes cast by the democrats in the primary election last April 10 was completed at the office of Secretary of State Frank Marsh Tuesday morning as to the non-political, state, and national tickets.

The count on the legislative tickets will be made public Wednesday afternoon.

The figures compiled in this official count have brought no changes so far as far as the nominees for the various offices are concerned, and only small changes generally in the votes received by the candidates as compared with the preliminary counts published prior to this time.

This final count shows that Charles Pool, democratic nominee for secretary of state, polled the largest vote of any candidate on the democratic ticket, with a total of 62,371.

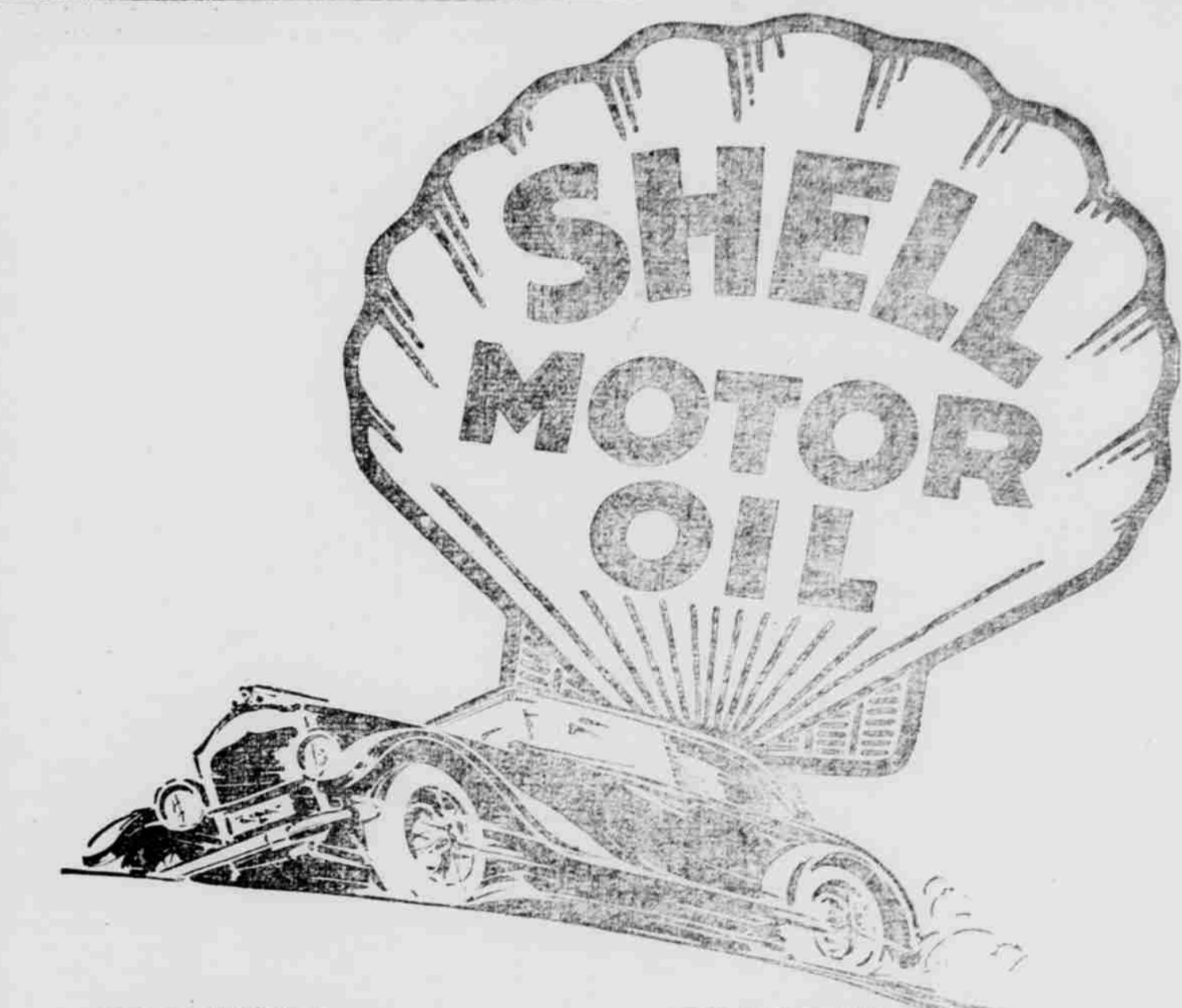

Supreme Court Will Hear Test of Important Case. Supreme Court Will Hear Federal Argument Relating to Realty Titles on May 11. The supreme court, because of the importance of the matter, has advanced for argument on May 11 the test case brought by the Rathbone company against C. C. Kimball, to determine whether federal judgments in the state of Nebraska are a lien on all property of the judgment debtor within the state without the filing of any transcript thereof or whether federal judgments are a lien without transcript only in the county in which the judgment of the federal court is entered, as the Lancaster district court decided.
