Election Returns to be Radiocast Over Big Hookup

Popular Artists to Give Selections Between Reports, It Is Planned

New York—The American people can sit at home on the evening of November 6 and have the election returns brought to them by radio. Results of the balloting, national state and local, are to be reported by the country-wide network of the National Broadcasting Company, it was announced here. The news will be furnished, the company's statement said, through the courtesy of the Associated Press, the United Press and the International News Service.

The progress of the vote tabulation in the Presidential and Congressional contests will be radiocast from the central studios in New York. This program will be interrupted occasionally for announcement of state county and municipal election news by local stations in the network.

Graham McNamee is to be master of ceremonies. Music and other entertainment by popular artists will intersperse the election radiocasts which will continue until final results of all important contests have been determined.

"The old methods of shouting news bulletins through the megaphone or showing them on lantern slides," M. H. Aylesworth, president of the company, said, "were not only limited as to audience, but virtually meaningless as to text. We propose to confine our election returns to such news as is indicative, and to present it in such form as to be readily understandable."

Persons experienced in handling election news and familiar with the technique of radiocasting will prepare the news for radiocasting.

Omaha Area Selected for New Vets Hospital

Bureau Officials Say Site Will Be Chosen in Territory Near City—Inspects 42 Sites

The site for the new veterans' hospital awarded to Nebraska, has been conclusively restricted to the area immediately surrounding Omaha, veterans' bureau officials stated here today.

The inspection trip of General Hines will be followed by that of a group of engineers who will make examination of a more technical nature. Texture of the soil and the quality of water available will be given particular attention.

Sees Sites from Air

General Hines who arrived in Omaha Tuesday to inspect 42 proposed sites left Thursday night for Washington.

L. A. Warren, supervising engineer for the bureau, with Glen B. Eastburn of the Chamber of Commerce made final inspection of sites in this area by airplane Friday morning.

A site near Ralston, the last listed with the committee, is said to find the most favor with the federal officials. Other sites which appear likely choices include another near Ralston, and tracts at Bellevue, Millard and Papillion.

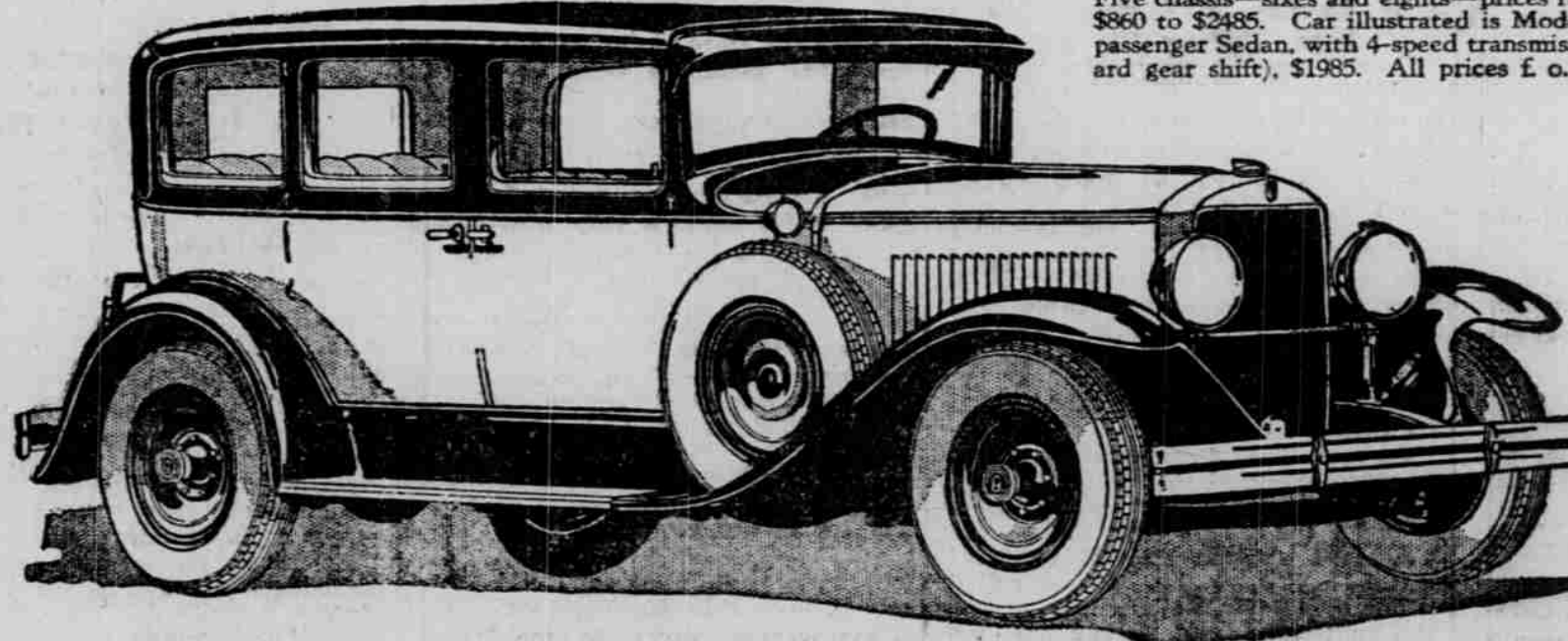

Northfield, Minn., Oct. 18.—In recognition of his reconstructive service to the nation and for his leadership "in the realization of humanity's hopes for a warless world," the degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Secretary of State Kellogg by Carleton college late today. Conferring of the degree took place

immediately after Secretary Kellogg had dedicated Severance hall on the Carleton college campus, to the memory of his life long friend and law partner for nearly two score years Cordeno A. Severance.

The hood of purple and maize significant of the highest degree that can be given by the college, was placed over the shoulders of the secretary of state by Dr. Donald J. Cow-

ling, president of the Carleton college. President Cowling paid high tribute to the constructive work of Secretary Kellogg in connection with his anti-war pact, his service to the country as ambassador to Great Britain and to his record in national legislative hall during his term as United States senator from Minnesota.
