Remodeling of the senate chamber to give more light and air, under the Copeland bill, would begin in March, 1929, if suggestions endorsed by the senate rules committee are accepted by the senate.

The measure, passed last session, provides for the expenditure of \$440,000 to move the senate chamber capitol, and to put three huge windows in the wall to provide light and air. The chamber is now ventilated solely by skylights. It is expected the work will be completed by the open-
