CARDINAL TOSI DEAD. ARCHBISHOP OF MILAN

Rome, Jan. 7.—For the first time since the so-called Babylonian captivity (when the popes lived at Avignon in the 14th century) the Italian cardinals are in a minority of four, with the death of Cardinal Tosi, archbishop of Milan.

There are now 29 Italian cardinals, 33 others and eight vacancies. This makes it practically certain that the pope will bestow several red hats at the spring consistory. Pope Pius was greatly touched at the archbishop's death. He was a warm personal friend who succeeded the pope in the Lombard diocese and he showed particular affection when he brought a Milan pilgrimage to Rome to usher in the Pontiff's Sacerdotal Jubilee year. Cardinal Tosi at that time was apparently in good health. He was stricken shortly after his return to his diocese.

London, Jan. 4.—The Daily Mail tomorrow will say that Andrew J. Mellon, secretary of the treasury of the United States, has purchased for 200,000 pounds (about \$970,000) Raphael's "Madonna," known as the Cowper Madonna. The art dealer, Sir Joseph Duveen, last May paid Lady Desborough \$175,000 for the famous painting which bears Raphael's signature and the date "1508."

London, Jan. 7.—There was an air of suppressed excitement today at the headquarters of the council of the Salvation Army, where preparations were being made for tomorrow's momentous meeting which will decide the question of the future leadership of the army.

Officers were coming and going constantly for conferences with Evangeline Booth, the American commander. Her official spokesman declined to see anyone. It was obvious that the delicacy of the situation was realized in all quarters.

The indications today were that a majority favor General Booth's removal and a new and more democratic form of government.

There are 64 votes on the council and it would take the general unit for continuance at his post.
