January 15, 1929 Nebraska has many things to be proud of, one of which is our national and state banking systems True that we like other states have had some bankers who have broken a sacred trust and have not kept honesty of purpose as the becon of their calling-others who through inexperience or unwise advancement of credit have caused their banks to be closed, yet Nebraska is today in a better financial condition than most of our sister states in the agri-

One of our leading financiers of international fame, J. P. Morgan, when asked upon what commercial credits are based, answered, "character, character before money, property or anything else, money cannot buy it. Character creates confidence Confidence is a requisite of borrower depositor and banker.

We as bankers have implicit confi dence in mankind. If we didn't have, our various communities would, in deed suffer. Our purpose is to build up, to help the deserving, to serve humanity and to make Nebraska the best place in the world to live.
