





Need of 'Iron' in School is Told Teachers

More Thorough and Disciplined "A" honors. Teaching Probably Greatest Aid. Educator Declares.

Kearney, Oct. 31. - American schools need a little in their educational systems, said Edgar W. Knight of the University of South aCrolina during his address before the district teachers' convention here on "The Danger of Fads.

"More thoroughness and better standards," he asserted, "is our greatest want.'

Changes may mean progress, he went on to say, but then again they may not. There are many complaints now that standards have been lowered and the value of discipline denied.

"It seems the fashion, he stated, "to believe now that a thorough and systematic knowledge of a subject is likely to crush the student's initiative. The word 'obedience' has become unfasionable. The student who rebels against doing anything is commended for his independence.

"The ideals governing education today are reflected in adult life tomorrow. If the ideals in schol lack virility, it is not reasonable to look for robust ideals outside of school.


