THE WALL STREET GAME

It's a great game they have been playing up in Wall street during the past few hectic weeks, and a lot of folks on the outside are wondering what it is all about.

Perhaps a little enlightenment may prove helpful.

We will take a suppositious case, so simple that even the most elemental mind may understand.

Three players engage in a game. All are equally skillful and no one enter into this hypothetical game. The law of averages provides that 11/2 miles from gravel. Terms to suit over a period of time. Each player breaks even; nobody wins, nobody

In order to make the game profitable, a person, whom we will call a creator, suggests to the players that they use chips instead of money. The creator issues these chips in exchange for their money, and from time to time distributes to each player some extra chips or some money out of the profits which the Creator earns by the use of the money in his industry. Everybody wins.

More players join the game, and soon the creator stops issuing any more chips for awhile, as he cannot use additional money to maximum advantage in exploiting his business.
