## A Mounting List of Deaths in Tempest

Nearly Two Hundred Fatalities in Storm That Has Lashed Coasts of Europe For a Week

London—While a rising barometer Tuesday night promised better weather for northwestern Europe, experts say it will work to compute the loss of human life and of property caused by the gale that has lashed Great Britain and the coast of the continent for more than a week. Revised figures show at least 184 persons perished. Most of them died at sea, more than sixty-nine ships having sunk, been wrecked or badly damaged.

The pilots of big liners were given unexpected free trips to foreign lands by the violence of the storm. The Holland-America liner *Sixteen*, on route for New York, was prevented by rough weather from dropping her Southampton pilot at the life of Wight. The pilot will make the trip to New York. Four other pilots are getting free trips to Madeira, Bremen, Cherbourg and London for the same reason.

Crippled vessels still are creeping slowly into port. The British liner *Ada* was one that limped into Cobb Tuesday with a makeshift steering apparatus.

Floods in the valley of the Thames have caused a serious situation. The river still is rising with its flow already twice the normal rate. The discharging capacity of the Thames when flowing full is 4,500,000 gallons per second, whereas Tuesday at Teddington the flow was 9,000,000,000 gallons. In some places the Thames is two miles wide whereas in normal days the river resembles only a good sized creek in the United States.—State Journal.

## HAVING FUN WITH GRUNDY

Washington—In the words of Senator Norris, another "Grundy Piggy" Weekly story containing wool products moved into the senate chamber Tuesday to take the place of the one on exhibit when the meta schedule of the tariff bill was under consideration. Standing beside the table of wool exhibits and recalling that Joseph R. Grundy of Pennsylvania is a worsted manufacturer, Norris appointed himself a "salesman" for Grundy and began "advertising" his goods.

Exhibiting a bright yellow wool jacket, Norris told the senators present: "If you have any tears in your eyes prepare to shed them now." "This is Grundy's mantle," he said, "and whenever you see it put it on. It was on the day Hoover won his great victory and sent the hordes of democrats back to the sidewalks of New York."

Mayor Gillis, who one time served a jail sentence for engaging in fistfights with Cashman, had a margin of forty votes over his rival.
