State School Funds are to be Re-Invested

State Has \$965,000 Bonds of Other States Soon Due, Says Treasurer Stebbins.

Nearly \$1,000,000 of long term low rate bonds of Massachusetts and Mississippi state bonds owned by the state of Nebraska are nearing maturity and when paid the funds will be reinvested in bonds issued by Nebraska cities, villages and school districts at a higher rate of interest, according to a statement by State Treasurer W. M. Stebbins.

Massachusetts bonds totaling \$59,-000, bearing 3 per cent interest, will mature Jan 1, 1930. Other bonds of Massachusetts bearing 31/2 interest will mature in 1934 and 1935. Mississippi state bonds amounting to \$200,000, bearing 31/2 per cent will mature in 1934.

These bonds total \$965,000. They are the only bonds of other states now owned by the state of Nebraska. The state has a total of \$13,700,000 invested in bonds. All these with the exception of the bonds of the three states listed are issued by counties, cities, villages, school districts or irrigation and drainage districts within the state of Nebraska. The average interest rate is about 4% per cent, said State Treasurer Stebbins. The bonds were bought with the state permanent school funds, which is a trust fund and the interests apportioned for support of public schools.
