



ger Call 1927 Statute Unreasonable.

The Nebraska law providing standard weights for loaves of bread was permanently enjoined from enforcement, by an order issued by the federal court at Lincoln, signed by Judges Kenyon, Woodrough and Munger.

The law, passed in 1927, provided that bread should be sold in halfpound and pound loaves. The standard for the pound loaf was that it should weigh not less than 16 ounces nor more than 19 1/2 ounces 12 hours after baking or delivery to custom-
