The plantation lies 590 miles inland from the Brazilian port of Para, 90 miles above Santarem, and occupies a beautiful site on this mighty river which joints the Amazon at Santarem. There are about 1800 men vorking. Fully 4200 will be required o carry out the full development.

Formerly the native Brazilian was onsidered as a serf receiving little nothing for his serviles. Today he Ford worker draws over 60 cents a day, and is given his board and room free. The more skilled laborer receives \$1.50 a day, while those required in the more exacting duties of rubber prodution receive as much as \$120 per month.
