



this national affiliation It is the desire of the Board that

proper reserves be set up by the cooperatives to meet their own peculiar conditions. In such cases, provision should be made for the ultimate distribution of such reserves and for the distribution of all other earnings, except the limited dividend requirements of capital stock cooperatives, upon a patronage basis.

Any such associations as above described will be eligible to do business with the Federal Board without the necessity of coming through or joining with any other organiza-
