Louisville Cannot be Closed

Fletcher Christian and Alexander Attorney General Sorensen Rules That Old Bridge Cannot Be Closed for Toll Bridge

> In response to an inquiry made of his office by H. B. Koop, cashier of the Home State bank at Louisville, Attorney General C. A. Sorensen, Saturday handed down a decision that the state and county officials cannot legally dispose or close a free bridge at Louisville and compel traffic to use a toll bridge.

The matter was brought up by the fact that some years ago the Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Wheeler, state and counties of Cass and Sarpy for many years spanned the Platte Need of Road purchased the old wooden bridge that river at that place, collecting the cost of the bridge in tolls and later making it a free bridge when the amount due the two counties was collected.
