Urge Income

Revenue Committee Deems Step Advisable; Consider 1 Per Cent Per \$1,000

Cedar Rapids, Feb. 3 .- The Iowa legislative committee on revenue and taxation, in a meeting held at Cedar Rapids Saturday, discussed the matter of drafting a legislative bill set-"The duties, powers and functions | ting up a state income tax and "rather generally agreed that such plan is advisable," Senator C. F. Clark, chairman of the committee, said Monday.

No action toward drafting the bill was taken, Senator Clark said.

Assuming that an income tax bill was satisfactory to the committee, he said, no bill would actually be drafted until after the next report to be made in about three months. 1 Per Cent Per \$1,000.

Another member of the committee in Des Moines Monday said the income tax bill discussed would contain few exemptions and that the rates very probably would be on the basis of 1 per cent on the first \$1,000 of

One per cent would be added, he said, for each \$1,000 of income up to \$5,000, when a flat rate probably would be established. The corporation tax, he said, was

left open for further investigation as to whether it was preferable to have it incorporated in the income tax bill proposed or be a tax of another nature in a separate bill.
