That part which would give to the commission on communication and power" jurisdiction over radio is all Thursday by Senator Johnson, Caliright, in as much as no state has fornia, for "some things that are simply not done in official life."

"However, when consideration is given to the regulation of telephone companies and electric utilities, the situation is exactly opposite. The preponderant pro-portion of all telephone business is intrastate.

"The same situation exists as to electric utilities, except that instead of jurisdiction over rates and service of electric utilities being asserted by the Nebraska commission, it is now asserted by the cities, towns and villages of Nebraska.

Interest Indrict.

"The Nebraska commission, of course, has no direct interest in the regulation of electric light rates and service.

"It appears to this commission that an inherent and fundamental fault in the bill lies in the attempt to apply to the telephone and electric companies a federal regulatory system which may be adaptable to the radio, sable and possibly the telegraph industries."
