### To Let Over 2 Million Worth **Road Contracts**

The first major awarding of road contracts for 1930, involving the estimated expenditure of \$2,100,000 by the state will be held at the capitol on March 27, State Engineer

Cochran said Friday. The construction involves sixtythree miles of paving, ninety-two miles of gravel surfacing, ten miles of graveling with culverts and incidental work, and two bridges.
