

In a letter sent Ralph Rawlings, its president, at Cleveland, O., Mr. Sorensen says that the bureau, from all evidence available, has been violating Sections 3425 and 3426, and he calls upon him for an assurance that these violations will cease, under penalty of action being taken against the Commissioner member companies.
