### Capture Store Robbers at Greenwood Early Today

Two Former Convicts From State Prison Detected and Caught Red Handed in Robbery

Late last night between 12 o'clock and 1:30 this morning the city of Greenwood, in the west part of Cass county was stirred by the robbery of the store of Anderson & Cope and the capture red handed a few moments later of the robbers by Marshal George Trunkenboltz, State Sheriff
