INSULTING A GOOD CUSTOMER

No business man who was in his right mind would deliberately set out to insult one of his best customers. If he did so, he would scarcely expect to sell him any more goods. Yet that is apparently what we are undertaking to do in the case of Russia. The Amtorg Trading Corporation, the Soviet purchasing agency, has bought \$67,495,000 worth of goods and machinery from the United States in the last nine months. Yet, a committee of the House of Representatives, on the basis of the dubious documents produced by former Police Commissioner Grover Whalen of New York, accuses this corporation of spending its time and money in spreading Communist propaganda in this country.

One of the committee's members forced Peter A. Bogdanov, the head of Amtorg, to admit that machines and materials purchased here will be used to manufacture goods which will subsequently be offered for sale, and then professes to see in this fact a deep plot to flood our markets and ruin our industry. The Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, Seymour Lowman, denies entry to two shiploads of Russian pulpwood, which had been sold to the International Paper & Power Co., on the ground that they had been loaded by convict labor. And Matthew Woll, on behalf of the American Wage Earners' Protective Association, cries for a complete embargo on all Russian goods, contending that all labor in Russia is conscripted into an economic army which is fighting to conquer the world for Bolshevism.

The imports of Russian coal, pulpwood and lumber, which have so distressed these people, constitute but a fraction of 1 per cent of our domestic consumption of these products. Our purchases of Russian fables, ermine, platinum and sausage casings scarcely present a serious threat to any American industry. Imports of managaneose ores, which are protested by Senator Reed of Pennsylvania, are similarly harmless. As our Tariff Commission pointed out, our own ores are inferior in quality and limited in quantity and should properly be conserved for our protection in the emergency of another war.

Our European competitors have proved to be much less finicky than ourselves about trading with the Soviets. Russian purchases in England for the nine months ending June 30 jumped to \$65,000,000 from the \$19,000,000; French sales from \$17,000,000 to \$21,000,000. At the same time that we are harassing Soviet purchasing agents here, European governments are extending their business men all possible aid promoting trade with Russia. Our policy has had the effect of holding up orders for our goods. Russian buying has declined at a time of year when it should normally be increasing.

American opposition to Soviet trade is short-sighted in the extreme. The Department of Commerce announces that Russia sold us \$21,520,000 worth of merchandise in 1929, but bought \$81,548,000 worth from us in the same year. Her purchases here exceeded her sales by more than \$60,000,000. She bought \$4 worth of goods from us for every \$1 worth she sold us. A trade boycott today would hurt us far more than it would hurt Russia. Our European competitors would be the only gainers. A decrease in our sales to the Soviet would only serve to accentuate our already serious unemployment situation. The International Harvester Co. has just extended its operations in its Milwaukee plants by 50 per cent to manufacture tractors for exportation to Russia. Neither American labor nor the American Government can afford to forbid such employment to our workmen today.

President Hoover's announcement that he will not permit the Treasury Department to place any sort of general embargo on Russian goods is particularly opportune. It is to be hoped that this action will lead to a restoration of economic sanity.

WALLED BRITISH DOMINIONS

Fifteen bankers have come out with a memorial for a protective tariff policy for Great Britain, which always has been a free-trade country in the main. So far the political leaders—Premier Ramsay MacDonald, Stanley Baldwin and Lloyd George—have not expressed an opinion on the subject. Unless the three of them denounce the proposal, it will become a live issue.

The aim of bankers is to confine the trade of the British dominions as far as possible to the mother-country. By excluding all other nations from carrying on commerce with the dominions, this business practically in toto would go to England.

Does not England control this dominion commerce anyhow? Everything being equal in any transaction, the dominion merchant ordinarily would

give preference to England. On the other hand, an attempt virtually to force the dominions into line might have reactionary consequences.

Mr. George only a few weeks ago referred again to the dominions as the British "commonwealth of nations." Each takes pride in feeling that it enjoys full dominion rights; in effect, that it is a free government, subject to Britain principally by sentiment.
