## Tydings Claims Hope for Democratic Senate

Nebraska Mentioned as a State Where One Guess Declared Good as Another.

Washington—An "even chance" for the democrats to gain control of the senate in the November election was predicted Saturday by Senator Tydings of Maryland, chairman of the democratic senatorial campaign committee. In the first extensive review of the senatorial situation, Senator Tydings went over conditions in each state and claimed a certain gain of six democratic members. To get control of the senate the democrats must win ten seats now held by the republican forces of fifty-six. A gain of ten members would make the lineup in the next senate republicans 46, farmer labor 1, democrats 49.

There are thirty-five senate seats at stake. Thirteen are now held by democrats, and eleven of these are in the south, where the party leaders insist the democrats will win. Senator Tydings says all thirteen democrats will be re-elected, although he realized Senator Steck, democrat, Iowa, has a struggle on his hands. Senator Tydings is opening headquarters here for the campaign with Edwin A. Halsey as committee secretary.

### Where Gains Are Expected.

In his review Tydings named Colorado, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Kentucky, West Virginia and Wyoming as states in which he expected democrats to unseat republicans. He added democratic chances in South Dakota, Delaware, New Hampshire, Illinois, Ohio and Oregon were good. He conceded conditions seemed to favor the re-election of Senators orah in Idaho and Couzens in Michigan, both republicans. Also, he said,

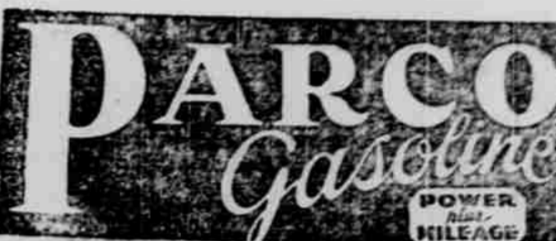
