## RUSHING THE NAVY TREATY

Vancouver—Two United States army aviators equipped with new pursuit planes capable of spending nearly 200 miles an hour, Tuesday night were waiting at Victoria to receive Japan's ratified London naval treaty and sped with it to New York. It is hoped to deliver the important document into the hands of Pierre de L. Bost, assistant chief of the western European division of the state department, in time for him to carry it to Europe when he sails Saturday on the Leviathan.

The copy of the treaty, signed by the Japanese emperor, must be deposited in London before the pact between the United States, Great Britain and Japan will become formally effective. It is desired to have the pact in force by November 6 when a meeting of the preparatory disarmament commission of the League of Nations is scheduled to be held in Geneva. Lieut. Irvin Woodring and W. M. Campbell have been selected to fly the treaty to New York.
