County and Banks Reach Agreement on County Funds

Action of Legislature to Relieve Situation.

The question of the handling of county fund deposits by the banks of the county, which has for several months been adding troubles to the burdens of the county treasurer and county commissioners, seems to have been temporarily at least settled in an agreement made by the commissioners and the county bankers as to the handling of the funds.

The banks have since the abolishng of the state bank guaranty law, been compelled to supply bonds or securities to secure the county deposits and this they have claimed. has entailed a great deal of additional expense to the banks, and with the law requiring the payment of two per cent on the daily deposits of the county, all of which is subject to check, the banks have felt that they were handling the county funds unprofitably, if not at a loss. The banks proposed that the county pay the deposits to partially repay them

The commissioners, while recognizing the claims of the banks, have felt that they were handicaped by pay the rate of two per cent on county funds and also makes no provision as to paying any service charge and seeking legal opinions the commissioners could find no advice as to the

legality of granting the request. The situation has become such that some action was necessary to allow the placing of the county funds, and accordingly on the general practice over the state of each county settling their own problem, the local commissioners have voted to allow one half of one per cent of a service charge to the banks, and which is to remain in force until after the legislature has an opportunity of enacting some law that will clear up a very annoying situation both for the various counties and the bankers.

BRIDGE NOW OPERATING

The Louisville bridge, new structure just completed over the Platte river at that place, is now in full operation and the Louisville Bridge Co., is engaged in the collection of tolls, John H. Busche, long time resident of this city, who has for several years lived at Louisville, being one of the toll keepers. The bridge replaces the old wooden structure which has been operated as a free bridge and the residents of that locality are now making their contributions to the new bridge and which will ultimately make the new bridge a free structure also. With the amount of traffic that passed through that section of the county the attainment of a fine modern toll free bridge ought not to
