
In the accident Mr. Troop suffer-ed a broken neck which was the direct cause of death and as he was dragged some distance after being hit the right leg sustained a double fracture below the knee and the head and body was very severely bruised as was the right forearm.

The identification of the car that struck Mr. Troop could not be made altho Bert Donaldson, who was approaching the scene thought the car to be a Chevrolet coupe but the number of which could not be learned.

Merton Scott was working at the Ofe Service station a short distance north of the scene of the accident and heard the impact as the car struck Mr. Troop and at once started to run to the scene and called to Dick Elliott who was also at the station to bring a car. As Mr. Scott started to the scene the death car was speeded up and started away. On reaching Mr. Troop it was found that he was dead, having suffered very severe injuries on the body and internal injuries that were fatal. The body was taken to the Sattler funeral home at once.


