

Cass County Farm Bureau Notes

Reorganize D. T. I. A.

O. H. Liebers, manager of the Nebraska Dairy Development society and E. C. Scheidenhelm, dairy specialist from the College of Agriculture, attended the meeting held on Thursday at the Farm Bureau office. Fourteen dairymen heard Mr. Liebers discuss pedigrees. "The bunk on pedigrees can readily be seen if you look for it," Mr. Liebers says. All the writing that says a certain animal may trace to another animal through a brother or grand-dam is "bunk," that is so far away that it has nothing to do with the animal in question. The things you want to know about a bull you might wish to buy are: Has he any daughters, and how much butterfat have they produced; if he is a young bull what his dam's record, not in butter but in butterfat, for a cow does give butter; what are his sisters' record if they have any and so on back through the pedigree. An example shown by Mr. Liebers was the pedigree of a bull purchased for \$160. After crossing out all the "bunk" there was not a single record of production for three generations.

Regardless of how good the records were generations back, the bull was only worth beef prices. "You might just as well have a scrub bull as a pedigreed one without a production record. Papers mean nothing," says Liebers.

Mr. Scheidenhelm explained the butter sires contest that the different Dairy Herd Improvement Associations throughout the state are conducting. This contest is primarily a study of the members own sires. Most every dairymen needs to know more about his own bull so the contest is organized to give this study and the associations that do the greatest improving in their sires will be awarded prizes.

4-H Leader Wins Trip.

Clarice Hottle, Elmwood, has been awarded a trip to 1931 Club Week at Lincoln. This trip was offered by the Burlington railroad to the outstanding local leader in each county through which their line passes, provided this leader has been a former club member.

Clarice has taken three years in clothing, one in girls room and led a clothing club for the past two years.

Women's Poultry Project.

There has been a demand from the county for a poultry course for women, a course that begins at the beginning of the poultry industry, the egg. A project has been planned which will deal with the simplest forms of poultry raising. From the old hen method to the most expensive incubator, from the small box house to the finest kind of brooder house.

There will be six lessons and members enrolling for the work will meet once a month at the regular training center in their part of the county. Any woman interested in this project should get in touch with the Farm Bureau office right away. The first round of meetings will be held the latter part of February.

Chick Mash Mixture.

With the present low prices of grains, poultry raisers should consider seriously whether they can afford to mix their own chick mash this year or buy it already mixed.

Profits will be lean enough at the best and mixing your own feed may be another means of lessening costs considerably.

The new recommended ration is:
 Yellow cornmeal 400 lbs.
 Shorts 200 lbs.
 Bran 100 lbs.
 Pulverized oat groats 100 lbs.
 Alfalfa leaf meal 80 lbs.
 Meat and bone meal 75 lbs.
 Dried skim milk or dried buttermilk 50 lbs.
 Salt 10 lbs.

1. For early season use 1% good grade cod liver oil. Mix fresh every week.

2. Direct sunshine whenever it can be provided without chilling chicks. Cod liver oil is after all only a substitute.

3. Green feed (alfalfa, clover, lettuce, lawn clippings, etc.) cut in short lengths when available.

4. The ingredients for this ration can be purchased and the ration mixed for about \$1.60 per cwt. figured at the present market prices of each. Compare this with already mixed rations before you buy.

The same mix makes a splendid ration for the hens.—D. D. Wainscott, Cass Co. Extension Agent; Jessie H. Baldwin, Ass't Co. Extension Agent.

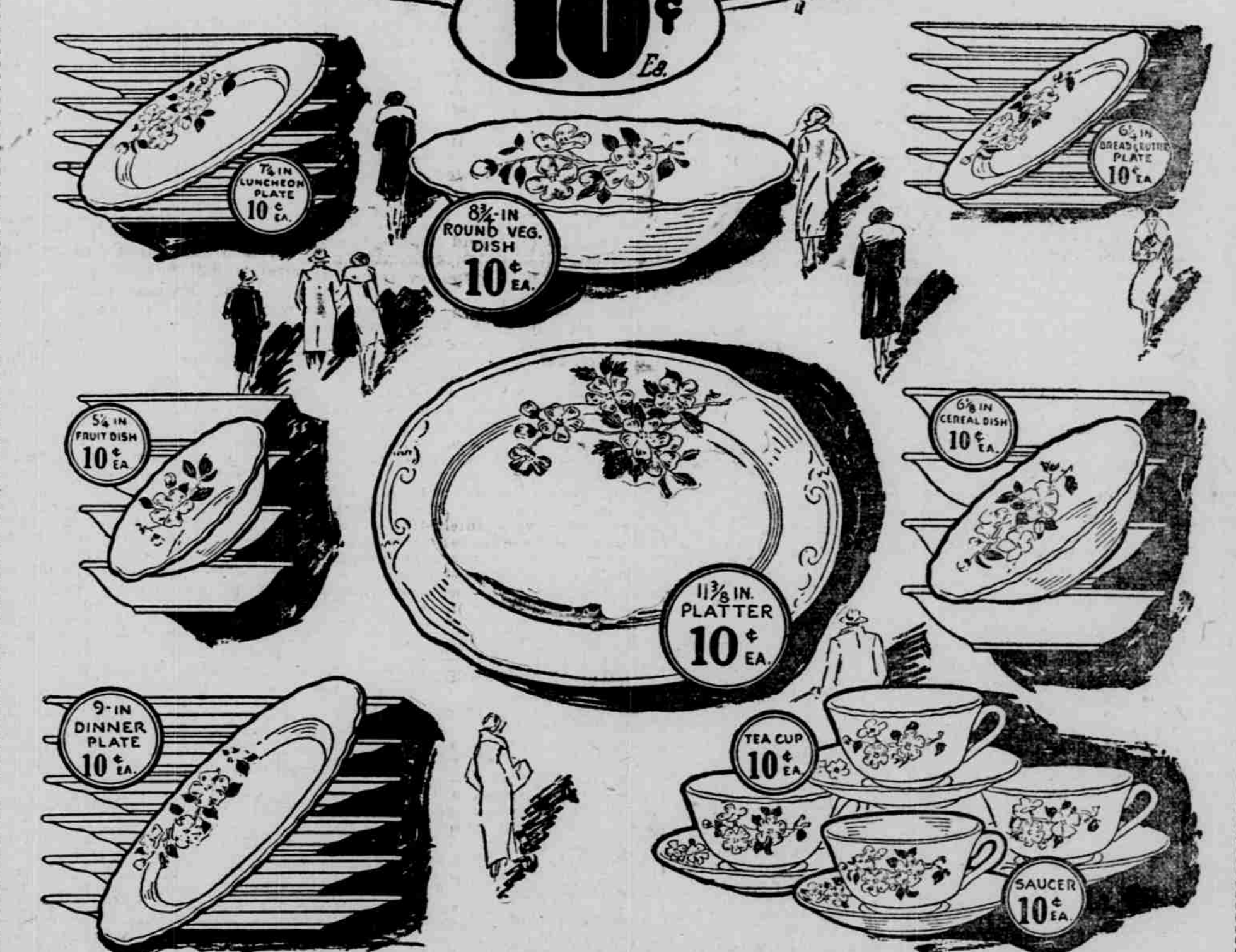
