

The Tennessee senator-elect, and former chairman of the democratic national committee, issued a formal statement asserting "high tariff walls here and everywhere have constituted the greatest single underlying


collapse.' Reviewing trade, unemployment, and other conditions, Hull demanded "a re-examination of our tariff rate structure with the view to its read-






