Grand Lodge Officers of Nebraska Are Present to Make Dedication— Local Quartet Sings.

In the presence of 250 lodge members, visitors and officers of the grand lodge, the \$10,000 Masonic temple at Elmwood, built a year ago to replace one destroyed by fire, was dedicated Friday night. Orville A. Andrews, Lincoln, grand master, presided at dedicatory ceremonies and formally dedicated the building.

The principal address of the evening was given by H. N. Mattley, Lincoln, acting as grand orator. Mr. Mattley is past master of Liberty lodge No. 309, Lincoln. In his brief address he explained the significance of the phrase, "A. F. & A. M.," and stated that in time of depression and distress Masonry had proved to be an anchor and safeguard of stability.

Officers of the grand lodge besides Mr. Andrews, who assisted in the services were: John R. Tapster, North Bend, deputy grand master; J. D. Ringer, Omaha, grand senior warden; Lute M. Savage, Omaha, grand custodian; Fenton B. Fleming, Lincoln, acting grand senior deacon; Virgil R. Johnson, Beatrice, grand junior deacon; Jacob North, Lincoln, grand treasurer, and Rev. Mr. Cline, Elmwood, as grand chaplain.

Clark Gonzalez, worshipful master of the amny lodge No. 209, Elmwood, together with other officers of the Elmwood chapter, assisted officers of the grand lodge. Representatives were present from Masonic lodges at Weeping Water, Palmyra, A. S. I. A. D., Nehawka, Greenwood, Plattsmouth, Beatrice and Lincoln. A male quartet from the Masonic lodge at Plattsmouth sang and Miss Cora Williams, worthy matron of Ideal chapter No. 181, O. E. S., Elmwood, contributed a vocal solo. Before the dedicatory service a dinner was served by the Eastern Star.

Will Attend Dedication The formal dedication of the new Masonic temple at Elmwood will be made on Friday at that place, the members of Canopy lodge are invited by the members of various Masonic lodges over the county to join in the dedication. The building that is being dedicated was erected by the Masons the past few months to replace the former building which was destroyed by fire.



CLASS RATES BECOME EFFECTIVE JUNE 15

A Washington dispatch Friday says that the interstate commerce commission denied the applications of western trunk line railroads and various state railroad commissions and chambers of commerce for reopening of the class freight rate decision made by the commission a year ago.


The railroads asserted that upward revisions of classified freight rates was "insufficient," although the commission estimated that the new rates would result in increases revenue to the lines of \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000.

In addition to western trunk lines asking for a reopening and reconsideration of the case, petitions from the states, and chambers of commerce of Lincoln, Fremont and Beatrice, Neb., Duluth and LaCrosse.

Rates originally were ordered to become effective Feb. 1, 1931, but under the denials they are scheduled to become effective June 15.

Nebraska commissions were not surprised at the decision, but did not look for an extension of the effective date.
