

FARM PROFIT 2.7 PERCENT

Kearney—The average farmer in Buffalo county who co-operated with the farm bureau last year in keeping farm account books earned 2.7 percent on his capital invested, according to the summary compiled by

the rural economics department at Lincoln. This is higher than the farms earned in eastern Nebraska but not as high as what was earned on the western Nebraska farms, according to L. D. Snipes, who assisted in returning the farm account books.

The men who kept books in 1929 and 1930 show a net decrease in labor and management wage of \$823 in spite of the fact that a much larger crop was harvested in 1930 than in 1929. The farmer who fed livestock was paid well for his extra labor, as \$152 was received for

each \$100 in feed fed to cattle, hogs, poultry and sheep. The high fifteen of this group had \$1,022 for their year's labor, while the fifteen least profitable farms lacked \$762 of paying 5 per cent on their investment, and got nothing for labor all year.

Split in Ranks of Cornbelt Farmers is Apparent

Minority Group, Des Moines Meeting Resents Alleged Effort to Discredit Hoover.

Des Moines—The national committee of farm organizations was formed by a minority group of the cornbelt federation after William Hirth of Columbia, Mo., chairman of the federation, together with others of its leaders, succeeded in seating by a 20 to 19 vote delegates from subsidiary farm union groups. While the farm board and its policies was the principal line of cleavage, the members of the new group resented what they termed was an effort on the part of Hirth to use the federation to discredit the Hoover administration.

Supporters of the farm board withdrew when the representation was increased, charging that the action was a move on the part of Hirth and other federation leaders to "pack" that body for the purpose of condemning the agricultural market-

KIDNAP CASE IS DISMISSED

Madison, Wis.—Charges of kidnaping, contained in warrants issued against Harry Hamilton Drill, St. Paul, and two companions, were dismissed in superior court here. On cross examination, Mrs. Drill, who swore out the warrants against the trio here, admitted the alleged kidnaping developed into a hilarious jaunt across the country after the quartet had left New York, where she claimed she was abducted on April 15 to tell several persons of her alleged plight or to cry out for help.

In dismissing the case Judge Schein said he was convinced it was "an escapade of a bunch of kids, who ought to be spanked."

"So far as Dane county is concerned," he said, "there is no proof of kidnaping. Moreover, in this state a husband cannot kidnap his wife."
