The much-discussed Indian monetary reform of 1926 consisted only in a change in the method of maintaining the parity of the rupee, by having redemption in gold bullion instead of redemption in London drafts. In line with this new program, the Indian Government has disposed of part of its silver in order to acquire a larger gold reserve. These sales by the Indian Government have probably had some depressing influence on the price of silver, but no such catastrophic effect as the friends of silver would have us believe. The fact is that less than 10 per cent of the silver put on the market during the last four years has come from the Indian Government, and during this same period the purchase of silver by the Indian public has far exceeded these sales. so that India has actually been a net purchaser of a third of the silver have us believe that the "foolish dumping policy" of India production of the world during a per-
