The removal of all interest charges on money obtained by the veterans and refunding of any interest payments already made to the national government, will be included in the request, Mr. Wolman said.

The veterans' commander revealed the contemplated action of his organization in answer to a speech made by Representative Johnson, republican, South Dakota, chairman of the house World war veterans' committeee, before the Iowa convention of the American Legion Wednesday. In his address the representative predicted that full payment of the adjusted compensation would be demanded of his committee when congress meets and said "I am convinced that it would be an impossibility to finance the complete payment of adjusted compensation, or the bonds at the present time."

BILBO'S FACTION BEATEN
