Nebraska Basket Company to Occupy Former Redmen Building With New Plant

The Territorial constitution provided that the capitol should be located by the Governor and the legislature acting together. Thus the controversy divides itself into the period prior to the assembling of the legislature in January, 1855 and the legislative contest which followed its meeting.
