Griswold Wins Over Wherry by a Safe Margin

Carpenter Holds a Slight Lead Over Osborne; Gordon Editor Has 3,000 Lead.

Dwight Griswold, newspaper publisher and former state senator of Gordon, Neb., is the republican nominee for governor. His majority over State Senator Kenneth S. Wherry of Pawnee City had mounted to more than 3,000 votes Thursday with only 24 small precincts to be heard from.

Complete unofficial returns from 2,025 precincts out of 2,049 gave: Griswold, 39,080; Wherry, 36,026.

The race was close, but Griswold's majority of 3,054 put him safely in the lead with no possibility that errors in the unofficial returns would offset the result. Wherry conceded the nomination late Thursday afternoon.

Wherry took the early lead on returns from Douglas and Lancaster counties and southeastern Nebraska. His home county of Pawnee gave him a 10-to-1 majority over Griswold. The western portion of the state stood loyally by Griswold and returned majorities sufficient to wipe out Wherry's lead.

Rural Vote Wins.

Wherry showed his expected strength in railroad centers, but Griswold polled an unexpected vote in the smaller towns and rural precincts.

Griswold will oppose Governor Charles W. Bryan for governor in November. Bryan defeated William Ritchie, Jr. for the democratic nomination by a margin of 5 to 3. Bryan ran strong even in sections of the state where Ritchie's supporters claimed he would win. Every county in the drought-stricken area turned in good majorities for Bryan and he carried all but two counties in the state.

Lincoln county, home of Keith Neville, head of the Ritchie state organization, gave Bryan a large majority. Returns from 1,965 out of 2,049 precincts gave: Bryan, 81,492; Ritchie, 47,506.

Harry O. Palmer of Omaha, who was one of the two successful candidates for the nomination for chief justice of the Nebraska supreme court, was in the city today. Mr. Palmer is a Cass county product and enjoys the opportunity of a visit with the old friends. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Emil F. Palmer, came here in the late twenties and resided in this city. Mr. Palmer being engaged with the store department of the Burlington. Later the family moved to Louisville where Harry Palmer was born. The candidate is a cousin of Misses Gerda and Alpha Peterson of this city. Harry Palmer is feeling very well pleased over the large vote given him in Cass county as the expression of the friends and supporters here where he is best known. He is a graduate of the Wesleyan university at Lincoln and also of the Harvard law school. While at Harvard he was editor of the Harvard Law Review and has been engaged as lecturer on law at the Municipal university at Omaha. In his career in the army Mr. Palmer served in the judge advocate's department of the army, holding the rank of major. He served as legal adviser to General W. S. Graves, commander of the Siberian forces of the United States and also to Col. William Morrow, head of the military forces in China, as well as executive in the office of the judge advocate at Washington.
