Wish to Have Salt Creek Straightened Near the Town for Elimination of Bad Condition
A delegation of the residents of Greenwood and Salt Creek precinct, were at the court house Tuesday afternoon to visit the board of county commissioners relative to proposed changes in Salt Creek.
Northwest of the town, Salt Creek, that historic stream, has formed in the years a large bend or "neck" that makes a great deal of trouble in times of high water and which has been long sought to be remedied.
The delegation was headed by Dr. N. D. Talcott and W. A. Armstrong and they laid before the board of commissioners their needs and desires in the way of some relief from the conditions that now exist in the course of the creek. The commissioners will look into the matter and see what is possible to do to give the residents of the northwest part of the county some relief.
