Aged Pioneer Answers Call. One of the long time citizens of Greenwood and one of the very best of women, who has been at the Bryan Memorial hospital for the past three weeks, passed away on last Wednesday night, 83 years and near six months of age.

Miss Mathilda von Norzinske was born in Preisen, Germany, coming to America when 21 years of age, and settling near Chicago. She came west and in 1877 was united in marriage with John Renwanz. Two sons were born, Otto the elder, and Paul, the younger.

The husband died in 1878. The mother was remarried in 1884 to James Slater. To this union two children were born, they being Harry Slater and a daughter, Clara, who became Mrs. Henry Greer who also died in March, 1925.

Mrs. Slater united with the German Lutheran church when a child in Germany, but when she came to Greenwood to make her home, united with the Methodist church here, being a faithful and devoted member during her entire life. Mrs. Slater was stricken with apoplexy and was taken to the Bryan Memorial hospital where she had been given the very best of medical attention and nursing, passing away at that institution on Wednesday, the funeral being held from the funeral home, by a prayer and reading of a portion of scripture when the funeral cortege came to Greenwood where the funeral was preached at the Methodist church, and the interment made in the beautiful Greenwood cemetery. The funeral oration was

delivered by the Rev. Dr. Aitken, the services being at the church at Greenwood, Friday, August 19th. Faces Glenwood Murder Charges in 'Ride' Slaying

Man Admits He Owns Gun Police Say Was Used in Killing; Check Bullets.

Archie M. "Buddy" Jenkins of Houston, Tex., said by police to have admitted ownership of a pistol which has been identified by ballistics experts as the weapon used to kill Angelo Sivigliano, will be taken to Glenwood, Ia., today. He will be charged with slaying Sivigliano, declared County Attorney W. W. Gilliland of Glenwood, who conferred with Omaha officials Friday afternoon.

Two other Texans arrested with Jenkins at a local hotel Thursday, Ralph Arnold of Dallas and C. J. Hester of Houston, also will be taken to Glenwood, Gilliland said. The county attorney and Sheriff DeMoss of Glenwood will come to Omaha for the three prisoners this morning. "The findings of the Omaha police ballistics expert are sufficiently conclusive to warrant filing charges against Jenkins," Gilliland said Friday night. "There seems to be no doubt that the gun found in his possession was the one used to kill Sivigliano."

To Check Up All Three. More than one man probably took part in the killing, Gilliland pointed out. For that reason Jenkins' companions will be taken to Glenwood as suspects.

Iowa officials will check up the movements of the trio on last Saturday night, when the Sivigliano murder was committed, in an effort to strengthen the case against them, Gilliland added.

Jenkins and two other Texans were arrested here Thursday in a general roundup of strangers following the Whitey Petty murder. Guns were found in the possession of all three, but only Jenkins' gun fires bullets that correspond with the ones that killed Sivigliano, police say.

Sought for Texas Murder. Police are now checking any connections Jenkins and Sivigliano may have had in Houston, Sivigliano

was wanted in Houston for murder, and is said to have operated there for some time.

Sivigliano was wanted for the murder of W. L. Edwards in Houston in May, 1930. It was Houston's first "ride murder." One suspect, John Belois, turned state's evidence and named Sivigliano and Sam Perretta as the killers. Both vanished. Belois testified against one other man, accused as an accomplice, but that man was acquitted.

Key Witness Slain. Eight months ago, in Kansas City, Belois was murdered. Sivigliano and Perretta were sought as suspects but no trace was found of either until Sivigliano was found murdered.

Jenkins, too was questioned concerning the Edwards murder, it is said, but soon released. A year ago Jenkins was again questioned as a murder suspect, this time for the killing of Chester A. "Keggy" Jones. Again he was released.

Jenkins denies he knew Sivigliano. "Compariscope" Tells Story. Friday morning the guns taken from the three men were fired once. The bullet from Jenkins' gun was put into the "compariscope," opposite one of the bullets from Sivigliano's body.

Magnified by powerful lenses, the riflings on the two bullets stood out plainly. According to Detective Ronald McDonald, the police ballistics expert, these bullet "fingerprints" are as accurate as human fingerprints; no two guns leave exactly the same markings.

The riflings on the bullet from Jenkins' gun and the bullet from Sivigliano's body correspond exactly, MacDonald and Inspector Danbaum said.—World-Herald.

Glenwood Victim of 'Ride' Wanted in Two Murders Say Angelo Sivigliano Sought for Two Years in Texas Case—Pal Also Slain. That Angelo Sivigliano, alleged Omaha racketeer shot to death on the highway near Glenwood, Ia., last Saturday night, was wanted in connection with murders in Houston, Tex., and Kansas City, Mo., was declared in a message received by Detective Inspector Danbaum at Omaha Thursday. The message was from the national fingerprint bureau at Washington, to which the slain man's fingerprints had been sent.

According to an Associated Press dispatch from Houston, Sivigliano, who was known by many aliases, is believed to be "Frank Adamo," sought since May, 1930, for the slaying of W. L. Edwards, The Edwards' killing was Houston's first "ride murder," Sivigliano was Adamo's real name, Houston police said. Sivigliano, with Sam Peretta, had been sought all over the country since the killing. To Test Captives' Pistols. John Belois, who was charged jointly with the two, was shot to death in Kansas City after he testified against F. L. Bonknight, who was indicted as an accomplice in the Edwards' slaying. Belois was granted immunity when he turned state evidence. Bonknight was acquitted. Perretta is still being sought. Ballistics tests will be made on bullets from two pistols found in possession of three men arrested at an Omaha hotel Thursday. Danbaum said, to determine if the guns had been used in slaying Sivigliano. The pistols are of the same caliber those used by the killers.

Wanted in Kansas City. The message from Washington, in addition to mentioning the Houston case, said Sivigliano was wanted in Kansas City under the name Angelo Mauro in connection with killing there. He was arrested there in 1922, the message added, for investigation under suspicion of black hand activities, but was released. Frank Amato, Council Bluffs man who was questioned by police regarding the murder of Sivigliano, forfeited a \$15 bond Thursday when he failed to appear in police court on a vagrancy charge.
