

Board of Equalization Sets Levy for Cass County

Valuation Show Loss of Almost \$10,-000,000-Levy for County Is Set at 3.13 Mills.

The county board of equalization net Thursday afternoon at the court house and set the levy for the various county funds for the year and approved the various village levies as presented by them.

The levy this year will be 3.13 mills based on a valuation of \$43,-422,106, as against a levy in 1931 of 2.96 mills in a valuation of \$53,-077,114, or a decrease in the taxes that the county will receive this year under the lower valuation, of

The valuation of the county in the year has been reduced almost \$10,-000,000 and made necessary the higher levy.
