Weiner Preliminary Hearing is Started

Owner of Millard Hotel Accused of Murder and Arson as Result of Burning of Hotel.

Omaha.—Preliminary hearing for Harry Weiner, owner of the Millard hotel here, on charges of murder (thru arson and of burning insured property, began in police court here Monday, and after a lengthy afternoon session, was continued until Tuesday afternoon.

The charges are the outgrowth of the fire that destroyed the hotel the night of Feb. 8 and resulted in the death of seven firemen, five of whom were crushed to death when a wall caved in.

The charges were filed after a lengthy investigation by state officials. Deputy County Attorney Crawford asserted the state would show that the fire was not started by defective wiring but by "something that caused an immediate flame."

Robert Hutchens, night engineer at the hotel, was the first witness called by the state. He testified that on the night of Feb. 7 he found Weiner in a laundry room. Weiner he said, was on a ladder, attempting to couple a piece of rubber hose to a sprinkler valve. The other end of the hose, Hutchens testified, hung out of a window. Hutchens testified that Weiner told him "I am fixing the sprinkler valve."

The engineer, who left town shortly after the fire, at first refused to answer questions about why he left but finally said "I got a letter so I left town."

At this point, Deputy State Attorney General Ramsey, who was active in the investigation that preceded the filing of the charges, handed to defense attorneys a letter that lay on the exhibit table. The letter, addressed to Hutchens, was mailed in Omaha on March 17 and contained a threat ordering him to "get out of town or be put on the spot." It also carried a warning against "squealing" and was signed with the name "Jammie."

Hutchens said that after leaving here he had gone to Missouri visiting "first one place, then another." —State Journal.

W. H. Venner, Old Veteran, at Last Long Rest

Long Time Resident of This Community Dies at Home Here Monday After Long Illness.

Monday evening at 7:40 at the family home in this city occurred the death of William H. Venner, 88, one of the last surviving veterans of the civil war in this city.

Mr. Venner had been ill for the past several months and gradually failing until death came last evening to his relief. Mr. Venner was for many years a resident of the Mynard community where he was engaged in farming, but in recent years has made his home in this city, where with Mrs. Venner, he spent the declining years.

This splendid old gentleman was one of the most genial of men personally and had a large circle of friends in the city and surrounding country, who will miss very much his presence now that he has been called away.

Mr. Venner is survived by the widow, their daughter having preceded the father in death a number of years ago.

Services at Sattler Funeral Home Largely Attended by the Old Friends and Neighbors.

From Wednesday's Daily This afternoon at the Sattler funeral home was held the services for W. H. Venner, long time resident of this community, who passed away on Monday evening at the family home in this city. There was a large number of the old friends in attendance at the services.

J. Sims Davis, of Omaha, reader, conducted the beautiful and comforting Christian Science services, bringing the message of the glory of the life to come and into which Mr. Venner has gone to his just reward.

Frank A. Cloldt gave as a solo number, "Abide With Me," while the Masonic quartet composed of Frank A. Cloldt, Raymond C. Cook, H. G. McClusky and R. W. Knorr, gave two of the hymns requested by the family, "Lead Kindly Light" and "In Thee O Spirit True and Tender."

Obituary William H. Venner, the son of John and Jane Venner, was born Oct. 4, 1844, near Corydon, Harrison county, Indiana. He was one of a family of nine brothers and sisters, of which but one brother, near Hartsville, Ind., is living. Mr. Venner attended college at Hartsville and spent several years during his young manhood teaching school.

During the Civil war, he enlisted with Co. E of the 134th Indiana volunteers, serving until the end of the war. About 1877 he came to Nebraska where he engaged in farming. With the exception of a few years spent near Hay Springs, Nebr., he has resided in and near Plattsmouth since that time.

He was married to Alva R. Cole, Jan. 8, 1885, and to this union one child, De Ella May, was born, who passed away seven years ago. He is survived by his wife and the one brother, also a number of nieces and nephews.

Mr. Venner loved truth and goodness and tried to conform life to these principles. He was always friendly and jovial and nothing made him happier than to entertain his friends in his home. Thus ends a long and useful and happy life here.
