Grain Men Decline to Condemn Strike

Refuse to Call Farm Holiday Movement an 'Unwise Experiment'—Choose Officers.

Omaha. — The Nebraska Grain Dealers association in convention here elected Gerald Eberberger of Columbus as president to succeed H. E. Day of North Platte, and closed the meeting by voting to strike out from the minutes a statement that called the farm holiday strike a "dangerous and unwise expedient."

The statement was made by J. N. Campbell, who was re-elected secretary, in an address at the opening session. In striking out the statement the convention accepted the minority report championed by F. C. Krotter of Palisade, a member of the resolutions committee.

Also stricken out of the resolutions was a further statement that such a strike "will decrease consumption, disrupt and demoralize marketing processes and destroy the business confidence so necessary to the free play of trading activity which enhances prices."

Krotter told the convention "it would do no good for us to take sides on the farm strike as the sentiment of our members is divided."

That part of the resolution which said the grain dealers are "in full sympathy with raising farm prices to a level comparable with the prices of things the farmers have to buy" was allowed to stand.

The resolutions pledged support of all governmental measures to raise agricultural prices, increase wages and stimulate all lines of business and industry, and voiced apprecia-

tion for the marked effort by the administration toward recovery.

But that part which urged "immediate and strong action be made to check the recession of prices in order that gains made may be sustained," was voted down as recommended by Krotter and his minority forces. He declared that this would put the association on record as favoring "even more government in business."

Resolutions on which the majority and minority factions were agreed included those urging the president to take steps to curb importation of rye from Canada, Argentina and Poland and deploring Governor Bryan's veto of the bill, before the last legislature, which would have reduced exorbitant scale testing fees by 50 percent. The association hopes the bill may become a law at the next session.

Other officers elected are B. W. Larson, Kimball, first vice president, and D. E. Minor, Hastings, second vice president. J. H. Jirion, Morrill, and J. C. Pace, Crete, were elected directors for three years and Mr. Minor and George Neuswager, Alliance, directors for two years.—State Journal.
