State Wheat Crop is Injured by Drouth

Some Has Blown Out—Keim Recommends Planting Ceres Variety—Also Kherson Oats.

The 1933-34 winter wheat crop in Nebraska has suffered somewhat by the lack of moisture this fall, reports reaching the agricultural college. Some of the wheat has also blown out.

To questions about crop production and particularly the wheat situation, Dr. E. D. Keim of the agricultural college says some farmers have written him about wheat which has not come up due to the dry weather. If this wheat did not actually sprout until spring, not much of a crop can be expected, he says. He says it might be well to plant about a bushel of Ceres spring wheat in the same field this spring. If a feed crop is desired, oats or barley will do as well. However, it is possible that with a very favorable season the wheat would come up and stool in a satisfactory manner.

Many farmers have also written for his opinion about Korean Lespedeza. He says it is considered a fairly good crop for the thin soils that are inclined to lack lime in southeastern Nebraska. The crop, however, will not increase fertility or give yields that either sweet clover or alfalfa will give. Lespedeza makes a good growth, is palatable and not supposed to bloat cattle and sheep as some other legumes do.

at the Nebraska experiment station show that the best yielding varieties are strains selected from either Kherson or Burt. Nebraska 21 is a white selection from the Kherson type and is probably grown as much as any other oat in the state. Burt 293 is an early type with more or less of a mixed color that has done very well over the state, especially in the southern part.
