#### **Farmers Must** Rush Their Corn Loan Requests ‡

None May Be Granted After February 28, Is Warning-Many May Be Too Late.

Thousands of farmers, eligible for corn loans if they would apply, may e left stranded in a last-minute rush. From three sources, a strong plea

was issued Tuesday urging farmers to rush their corn loan applications into government offices if action is expected before the deadline of March

No loans may be granted after February 28, according to Herbert here, and unless farmers start making application for loans soon they may not be able to complete the necor with their local bankers.

What Is Necessary. Daniel's fear was echoed by State Railway Commissioner Drake at Lincoln and by Ray Murray, Iowa secre-

tary of agriculture. Before midnight of February 28, any farmer who wants a corn loan nust apply for warehouse certificates, have his cribs inspected by the railway commission, get a certificate issued from Lincoln, file a duplicate with the county clerk and fill out application blanks to be sent to the Commodity Credit corporation here or to his local bank.

If all farmers held off for the announcement of the corn-hog policy in February, many of them will be unable to get in touch with inspectors in time to complete the important warehouse inspection, Daniel fears,

Caring for Summer Meat Supply An early cold spell in January or very early in February is the best time for killing hogs which are to be canned or cured for the summer meat supply.

Hogs weighing from 225 to 250 pounds dress up to the best advantage for most farm families. Scalding and scraping the animal are better than skinning especially where cuts are to be cured. Where the skin has been removed from pork cuts, the fat becomes rancid move quickly due to exposure to the air.

#### Plant Windbreaks to Works

Protect the Farmstead Because of danger from tree intouch with the Farm Bureau office sects and diseases and different growth habits, a windbreak should be made up of three or four varieties of trees and should include at least one row of evergreens. Evergreens are much slower in getting started than broadleaf trees but are long lived and

will serve as a year-long windbreak. Following is a list of trees that are available for co-operative windbreaks and woodlot plantings on farms in Nebraska. Applications will be approved in the order of their return until the supply of stock is ex-

Broadleaf varieties: American Elm, Chinese Elm, Cottonwood, Green Ash, Catalpa, Honey Locust, Soft Maple, Box-Elder, Hackberry, Russian Mul-

berry, Russian Olive and Caragana. Evergreen transplants: Austrian Pine, Yellow Pine, Eastern White Pine and Jack Pine. Send in your application before the
