August Kaffenberger Born and Spent Lifetime on Farm Where Death Occurred.

August Kaffenberger was born June 29, 1892, on the homestead of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Adam Kaffenberger, long time residents of Eight Mile Grove precinct, spending his lifetime on the farm and where his death occurred on last Thursday morning. He was the youngest son of this pioneer family.

Mr. Kaffenberger received his education in the schools of his community and later turned to the vocation of farming which he continued to follow for his life avocation. With the retirement of the parents from the farm home he continued to carry on the work there.

On February 16, 1916, Mr. Kaffenberger was married to Miss Margaret Trisch, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John P. Trisch, also one of the prominent families of the community. To Mr. and Mrs. Kaffenberger there was born two daughters, Bernice and Ellen, who with the wife survive his passing.

There are also surviving four brothers and four sisters, John, Adam, Fred, Mike Kaffenberger, Mrs. Julius Hilsicker Mrs. George Stoehr, Mrs. Clarence Meisinger, Mrs. John Kaufmann, all of this immediate community. One sister and the parents preceded him in death.

In his childhood Mr. Kaffenberger was baptized in the Lutheran faith but in recent years had been a member of the First Presbyterian church of this city. He was also a member of Plattsmouth lodge No. 6, A. F. & A. M., Nebraska chapter No. 3, Royal Arch Mason, Mt. Zion commandery No. 5, Knights Templar and Home Chapter 189 of the Eastern Star of this city.
