## Bible School Lesson Study!

Sunday, June 3rd

"Jesus in the Shadows of the Cross"  
Matt 26: 31-46

Let us say to the earnest, sincere Bible student: "Put off thy shoes from thy feet, for the place wherein thou enterest is holy ground."—Gethsemane. Gen. 3:5. Much of great importance is provided in this study day before the crucifixion.

1. The anointing at Bethany by Mary, sister of Martha and Lazarus.  
2. The betrayal by Judas Iscariot.  
3. The preparation of the pass-over.

4. The Lord's Supper instituted.  
5. Peter's denial foretold.

These events require an intensive study, they are very significant. All have a direct bearing on the great doctrine of the atonement. The incident of the washing of the disciples feet must not be overlooked; as also the consolation chapter, John 14, and the great high-priestly prayer of our Lord, John 17, should be given proper attention. The last hymn is sung—yes Jesus could and did sing—Ps. 115-18, that would close the passover. Jesus and the eleven left the upper room for the garden of Gethsemane. On the way Jesus revealed to the eleven what would take place according to the old prophecy (Zech. 13:7): "I will smite the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock shall be scattered abroad." "This night—so near the crisis, a matter of hours. The shadow of Gethsemane is beginning to fall on Christ's own spirit, and He knows how it must fare with men unprepared for what is coming."

—Prof. A. E. Bruce. But Jesus includes a promise. He will meet them in Galilee, after His resurrection. But Peter the impetuous, the outspoken, takes exception to the charge. "If all shall be offended in thee, I will never be offended." "And he meant every word he spoke. There were present, at least, a passionate devotion, a resolve that no hurt, which he could ward off, should touch that revered body, and the inner consciousness that it would be easier and far better to die with Christ than live without Him."—Rev. D. F. Meyer.

They might forsake the Master, but he never would! Yet he was the one who did. Peter could not believe that such a thing, as denying his Lord was possible for him to do. Oh, how little a human soul knows its own folly! Self-conceit brought disaster to Peter, and all the rest—all fled when Jesus was arrested. The little company had come by this time to the garden. Eight of them are to guard the gate, three are to go with Jesus to witness his agony. They had seen His glory on the mount of transfiguration, they had witnessed His power over death in the home of Jairus, they are to be His companions in His suffering. But—alas—they sleep, as they did on the mount of transfiguration. Peter, James and John

are the inner circle of the twelve. Jesus said to them: "My soul is exceedingly sorrowful, even unto death: abide ye here with me."

No one of us can imagine the awful pressing down upon the pure spirit of the Saviour. He did not fear physical agony and death, but the death of the soul, the separation from His Father. Truly he was "made sin for us." He who "knew no sin." (2 Cor. 5:21.) "Abide ye here and watch with me." It was a very human feeling that Christ showed, this need of companionship in his suffering; and let us not forget that men and women around us have the same need. Then he went a little forward, and fell on his face, and prayed, saying, "My Father, etc." Always, however, bitter the cup extended to Him. He knew that it was in His loving Father's hand. The victory over Satan, sin and hell was won in Gethsemane, not on Calvary.

The demand of the law was satisfied on the cross. Did Jesus receive an answer to His prayer? Assuredly he did. "If it was not possible—nevertheless, not as I will, but as thou wilt"—complete submission—surrender—and the battle is won. No one has ever achieved the victory over sin and self, except by a complete surrender to God's will.

Dear reader: Stop and see the Saviour on His face agonizing until "sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground." Luke 22:44, in pity and mercy the Father sent a messenger to strengthen him. Luke 22:43. He took my place." Praying three times, practically the same prayer, is not vain repetition, but there are prayer repetitions which cannot be avoided because they spring from a distraught soul. "Oh, what do you offer to the dear Lord in His garden of sorrow? Be one with the angels that comfort Him, by giving Him joy in the midst of His sorrow. Tears of contrition, a broken and contrite heart, fervent aspirations of faith and love tokens of zeal, a close walk, a heavenward look, all these are spices and honey and milk to sweeten the cup that is put to the lips of Jesus after the gall and vinegar."—Rev. Baring Gould.

"The hour is at hand." Jesus had come to His hour that as the Lamb of God He was to be placed on the altar as a sacrifice for the sins of the world. He was ready. Reconciled to the will of the Father. "Arise, let us be going." These words, quiet as the rippling of a brook, cover a sublime heroism, a steadfast purpose that nothing can shake, to face the bitter end. Jesus, who in the days of His flesh, when He had offered up prayers and supplications, with strong crying and tears unto Him, that was able to save Him from death, and was heard, in that He feared. Heb. 5:7.
