Million Less Hogs than Were Listed in State

Federal Board Says That a Checkup Will Result in Proper Payments.

The state corn-hog board of review Wednesday issued a statement estimating the overstatement of hogs in Nebraska as shown by contract and non-contract data at 1,030,000 head or about 12 percent of th state's annual hog production.

"This is based," the statement said, "on absolute records of hogs marketed so there is positively no doubt as to the overstatement."
