The emergency feed loans which are being advanced in the primary drought areas are disbursed from the drought relief appropriation approved June 16, 1934, and made in monthly allowances. Applications are received by the local crop and feed loan committees operating in counties thruout the drought area. Begun early year. in Jnc, to date more than 134,000 of such loans and supplemental advances have been made for over \$10,-000,000.
