### ENROLLMENT STAYS HIGH

Beginning the school year with a record enrollment of \$45 at the close of the fifth week of school last Friday only a net loss of three was shown on the high school register, the total to date being 341. As usual, there are more girls than boys in school with a total of 184 against 148 boys. In every class but one, the girls outnumber the boys by ten or more. The one exception being the senior class with 32 boys and 24 girls.

The non-resident enrollment this year is the highest in the history of the school with a total of 92, including 50 girls and 42 boys. This is a fine evidence of the drawing power of the school in the communities around Cass county.
