Will Mitchell, brakeman, working in the yards outside also saw the meteor and told Holmes it "nearly scared me to death." Both men said it appeared to be about one hundred feet high.

R. I. Monroe, operator at South Bend for the railroad and J. J. Krone, of Lincoln, heard the explosion but did not see the meteor, they told Holmes over the railroad's telegraph line. Alvo is about half way between South Bend and Lincoln.

The meteor was traveling south, out of the north, Holmes reported. He had no idea where it may have hit.
