

GEORGE W. P. HUNT IS DEAD

Phoenix, Ariz .- Death ended the Paul Hunt, 75, former waiter, cowboy and copper mine mucker who became such a political power in Arizona that he captured the governorship seven timse. He served as U. S. minister to Siam in 1920-21 and performed other services for the federal government. His seventh term as governor ended in 1932.

Known as the "old Roman" of Arizona politics, he first was elected governor in December, 1911, about two months before Arizona was admitted to the union. He was the "baby" state's first, second, third, sixth, seventh, eights and tenth chief year in the democratic primary by the incumbent, Gov. B. B. Moeur, who also vanquished him in 1932.
