Lloyd Peterson was the most severely injured as he suffered a deep gash over the eye and across the temples from the brok en glass and possible loss of one eye. Tyler also was badly cut on the face and hands by the glass and both suffered severe bruises.

Porter was burned to a crisp in his car and identification was difficult as all clothing was practically destroyed and it was only from papers scattered in the car that had escaped the flames that his name was learned.
