Perennial Weeds Are Worse Than a 50 Percent Mortgage, Agronomist Warns.

A good workable weed law, if farmers become "weed minded" and co-operate in eradicating such pests, is needed in Nebraska, F. D. Keim, chairman of the college of agriculture agronomy department, believes. Setting up a law which will do some good and not work too many hardships upon those having a great amount of land covered with weeds is not an easy job, Doctor Keim says. A noxious weed law should set up eradication districts by petition. Unless the problem is attacked by precincts, townships or communities, very little good will be accomplished.
