Prisoners in Michigan's jails and prisons will be paying their own board from now on. That is, those that can pay. According to a statute passed by the last legislature, whenever a person is admitted. to a prison, the attorney general may file in the sentencing court a claim against the new inmate's estate. Upon a court order, the estate or property becomes liable to levy. Those prisoners who have small estates or dependents are exempt from this statute, however.
