William Flake is Named New State Sheriff

Buffalo County Sheriff Is Named by Governor Cochran to Succeed Benton.

William Flake of Kearney, sheriff of Buffalo county for a number of years, was appointed state sheriff Tuesday by Governor Cochran, succeeding Fred Benton, who has held the office about a year. Flake's appointment takes effect Dec. 1. The office pays \$390 a month.

Governor Cochran praised Benton for his work and emphasized that the appointment of Flake was not reflection on Benton, who was not reappointed last January when Cochran became chief executive.

Benton said he had been expecting for some time to be relieved of the office, and congratulated Flake, an old friend, on the appointment. Benton, a deputy under former Sheriff Endres of Omaha, was promoted to sheriff in January, 1934.

Flake, 38, served two terms as Buffalo county sheriff and was elected on the democratic ticket. He retired last January after declining to run for re-election last year. He is widely known to Nebraska peace officers for his co-operation in helping round up criminals wanted elsewhere.

He said he had no plans and would have no statement until he formally takes office and learns how the office is run and what funds and equipment are available.

Benton, whose home is in Lexington, said he expected to spend the winter in Lincoln.
